What is Nonviolent Crisis Intervention

Training?

This Introductory Level Training Program consists of crisis intervention techniques, both verbal and physical, that provide care, welfare, safety and security for everyone involved in a crisis situation. The goal of this program is to teach foster parents proactive strategies ~ to prevent a crisis from escalating ~ with an emphasis on communication skills.

BASIC PROGRAM

The Basic Program is for foster parents
who have not taken NVCI before or whose
NVCI certification has expired (more than
13 months since last certification) and
they are required to repeat the Basic
program. This introductory program
consists of twelve hours of training
over a 2 day period.

Additionally, we would like to acknowledge that within Nova Scotia, people of African ancestry settled and contributed to the building of many formative developments, particularly in the 18th and 19th centuries; this includes the Black Loyalists who fought on the side of Britain during the American War of Independence, the Maroons, who fought and never surrendered to the Spanish and British in Jamaica and Southern American Black Refugees, who fought on the side of the British during the War of 1812.
