Foster Care Redesign is Demonstrating Benefits

Staff at DCS and MFCS were happy to see many of you at events for Foster Caregiver Appreciation Week! It's a great opportunity to express our thanks and support for the important role you play in the lives of children and youth in care.

Through the implementation of Foster Care Redesign, we've also been able to put in place changes that address many of the challenges foster caregivers had shared with us.

Caregivers Benefitting from MOCKINGBIRD FAMILYTM Constellations!

Foster Caregivers have all been part of a MOCKINGBIRD FAMILYTM Constellation since the end of April. While it takes time to build relationships and achieve all the benefits, we are hearing more and more stories of how constellations are having a positive impact on children/youth in care.

Benefits of Being in a Constellation:

- -Improved stability and reduction of breakdown in foster homes
- -A network of strong relationships and connections like an extended family
- -Improved experience of peer support and sibling contact
- -Improved process for planned and unplanned respite
- -A resilient structure to support children, youth, and foster caregivers through times of crisis and transition

Some examples that we've heard are:

- Hub Home reaching out to youth while at Wood Street to be able to offer support when they returned to their kinship home.
- Foster caregiver was scheduled to go out of province and the respite arrangement fell through at the last minute. The Hub Home was able to provide the respite for the child during that time.
- A foster caregiver has fostered a child for many years and had previously struggled with trusting others for respite but since joining their Constellation, the foster caregiver has connected with the Hub Home and feels comfortable having them support with respite.
- A Satellite Home had an emergency while the children in their care were at school. The Hub Home was able to step in, pick the children up, and care for them until the Satellite Home was able to return home.
- A Satellite Home was not attending the gatherings; so the Hub Home attended the satellite home to talk about barriers to their attendance and worked together to come up with resolutions. Through this connection, they were able to identify a better location for gatherings, meet the two youth at the Satellite Home, and arrange for respite.
- Satellite Homes that have been struggling with parenting the child in their care, have identified that their Hub Home was able to provide respite to support the child and prevent a foster home breakdown.
- Hub Homes have been working together to maintain sibling contact. Three siblings have been placed in two nearby constellations and the Hub Homes of the two Constellations connect when they are providing respite for the siblings to ensure sibling contact.
- Two Satellite Homes in different Constellations each have a child with significant medical needs. The Hub Homes have been able to connect the two Satellite Homes, and one of the Satellite Homes has been able to support the other in the navigation of medical service and supports.

Our goal in implementing Mockingbird FamilyTM approach was to have more positive outcomes for our children in care; we are already seeing those positive impacts for both children in care and foster caregivers! Thank you for continuing on this amazing journey of Foster Care Redesign!

Fall Training Recap: What a Season!

This Fall, we kept busy with an exciting lineup of training opportunities for foster caregivers—including two brand-new courses designed with your needs in mind!

First up, our **Sensitivity Program** got a major refresh! We've condensed it into a 1-day session (goodbye, 2-day commitment!) and ran it on a trial basis to fine-tune the content and see how it resonated with caregivers. The feedback? Fantastic! We're thrilled to say you can expect more sessions this Spring.

To save you time, we also introduced a **blended online Non-Violent Crisis Intervention course**. This new format combines a 3-hour online session you can complete at home with a 3-hour in-class portion. This trial run allowed us to test the waters, and we're excited to roll it out across all regions in the Spring.

Of course, we're still offering the **2-day Basic Non-Violent Crisis Intervention training** for new caregivers. It's a cornerstone of our program, ensuring every new caregiver feels supported and equipped for success.

Thank you for your participation and feedback! Stay tuned for Spring, where even more training opportunities await.

Merry Christmas and Happy Holidays!

From our kitchens to yours we would like to share a favorite recipe to try with the children and youth in your home this festive season:

Gingerbread boys/girls

1/2 c. shortening
3/4 c. sugar (I use brown)
1 1/2 c. molasses
1 egg
1 tsp. vinegar
Cream together. Then add alternately:
1 heaping tsp. baking soda dissolved in 3/4 c. boiling water
with:
5c. flour - add a bit more if the dough is sticky
2 tsp. ginger
1 tsp. cinnamon
1/4 tsp. salt
(can add extra 2 tsp. cloves and 1/2 tsp. nutmeg to make them "spicy")
Chill dough, roll and cut into gingerbread boys/girls and bake at 370 degrees for 10 minutes. Cool and decorate.

Candy Cane Crinkle Cookies

3 whole candy canes, crushed 1/2c. butter, softened 1c. white sugar 1/2 tsp. vanilla 1 egg 1/4 tsp. salt 1/4 tsp. salt 1/4 tsp. baking powder 1/8 tsp. baking soda 1 1/2 c. flour 1/2 c. icing sugar Preheat oven to 350 degrees. Grease or line with parchment 2 cookie sheets. Crush candy canes in a bag with a rolling pin. Cream butter and sugar. Whip in vanilla and eggs. Stir together dry ingredients (except icing sugar) and add to wet ingredients, mix to combine. Add crushed candy canes. Roll into heaping tsp size balls, roll in icing sugar. Bake 9-11 minutes or until bottoms barely brown and top matte not shiny. Cool on pan for 3 minutes.

A Little EASY Christmas Treat: 3-Ingredient Shortbread Cookies

Ingredients:

- 1 Stick (115g) Salted Butter
- ¹/₂ Cup (60g) Powdered Sugar
- 1¹/₄ cups (175g) All-Purpose Flour
- 1 tsp Vanilla (Optional)

Instructions:

- 1. Preheat your oven to 350°F (175°C).
- 2. Cream the butter and powdered sugar together until smooth.
- 3. Gradually mix in the flour (and vanilla, if using) until a dough forms.
- 4. Roll the dough into small balls and flatten slightly with a fork or your hands.
- 5. Bake for 12-15 minutes or until the edges are golden.
- 6. Let cool and enjoy!
